Translation

There will be no simultaneous interpreting from English into German of French at all.

How to get to the Dominican Monastery Walberberg:

1. By Car

from the North: Travel Autobahn (highway) A1 or A3 to Autobahnkreuz (junction) Leverkusen. Take A1 and A61 Koblenz—direction until you reach Bliesheimer Kreuz (junction) then travel A553 Brühl—direction. Take Ausfahrt (exit) Bornheim. From there it will be 1 km to the Dominican Monastery's gate 5.

from the South (up from Frankfurt): Travel A3 to Heumarer Dreieck (junction), proceed on A4 Aachen—direction to Autobahnkreuz (junction) Köln—Süd and from there on A555 Bonn—direction. Take Ausfahrt (exit) Godorf and proceed on freeway A553 Euskirchen—direction, where you will have to take the Bornheim exit. From there the Dominican Monastery's gate 5 will be 1 km.

from the South (up from Koblenz): Travel A61 Köln-direction to Bliesheimer Kreuz (junction) then A553 Brühl-direction. Take the Bornheim exit from where it will be 1 km to the Dominican Monastery's gate 5.

2. By Train

down from Köln (Cologne): The subway is underneath the Köln Main Station. Take line 11 or 12 to Barbarossaplatz where you will have to switch to the line 18 — which runs every 30 minutes — to Schwadorf (not Walberberg!). From the Schwadorf station it will be a 15 minutes' walk to the Dominican Monastery's gate 5.

up from Bonn: Take the line 18 leaving from the station near the Bonn Main Station — which runs every 30 minutes — and get off the train in Schwadorf (not Walberberg). From the Schwadorf station it will be 15 minutes walk to the Dominican Monastery's gate 5.

3. By Air

down from Köln (Cologne)/Bonn Airport: by bus to Bonn Main Station, then take line 18 (see by train from Bonn, above).

down from Düsseldorf Airport: by train from the airport to Düsseldorf Main Station. Then by train to Köln (Cologne) Main Station. Continue to line 18 (see above).

up from Frankfurt International Airport: by train to Frankfurt Main Station. Take a train to Bonn Main Station. Then line 18 (see above).
